The second program focusing on the Battle of Gettysburg will once again be led by Tom Prisk of Chapel Hill, a member of our RT and a Licensed Gettysburg Battlefield Guide. The October program was attended by a large crowd of members and visitors who listened as Tom led us step-bystep through the first, and part of the second, days of the fighting at Gettysburg, introducing us to little-known and interesting new facts and perspectives about the battle. The two-hour program was riveting as Tom lectured, as panel members John Krohn and Ted Lynch posed provocative questions and as RT members added their own comments and interpretations.

The November meeting will explore the struggle for Culp's Hill on the second day and the Pickett-Pettigrew assault on the third day. Tom is extremely knowledgeable and gives an outstanding presentation. You can be sure you'll learn something new!

#### BENTONVILLE BATTLEGROUND HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION Recent Battlefield Land Purchase

The BBHA recently purchased a three-and-a half acre portion of the Bentonville battlefield which contains well-preserved trenches in an area where Union and Confederate troops clashed on the second and third days of the battle. The land was bought at public auction by BBHA, paid for with a grant from the North Carolina Natural Heritage Trust, and turned over to the State of NC

The BBHA is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization devoted to the preservation and interpretation of the Battle of Bentonville. You can join the Association by sending \$20.00 to BBHA, Box 432, Newton Grove NC 28366. Your \$20.00 will buy one square foot of land at Bentonville and you'll receive a frameable certificate of ownership. This is a superb local preservation group which will focus greater regional and national attention on the significance of the Battle of Bentonville!
