TWENTY-TWO DAYS OF TERROR: THE SAGA OF THE C.S.S. ARKANSAS January 9 Meeting

Theodore P. Savas is the editor of the popular Civil War Regiments: A Journal of the American Civil War, a quarterly devoted to the scholarly examination of Union and Confederate regiments in particular battles or campaigns as well as other CW subjects. His Savas Publishers produced Mark Bradley's book on the Battle of Bentonville and will be printing Chris Fonvielle's forthcoming book on the Wilmington Campaign. Ted, an attorney in San Jose, California, has authored numerous Civil War articles and book reviews and co-edited The Campaign for Atlanta & Sherman's March to the Sea (1994). He served as Project Historian for the recent expedition to find the submarine CSS Hunley, off Charleston, SC, in August-September, 1994. Ted is well-known to many in the Civil War community and is regarded as one of the nation's authorities on the American Civil War. Ted co-founded the San Jose Civil War Round Table several years ago and he's been a presenter at many RT's and CW conferences around the country.

Ted's topic for our January meeting will be the brief, but exciting career, of the CSS Arkansas which operated in the summer of 1862 in the Yazoo and Mississippi Rivers. In its first engagement, this Confederate ironclad encountered three Union vessels; it disabled the Carondelet

and caused the Tyler and the Queeen of the West to retreat.

Ted is a very lively and dynamic speaker, and we're fortunate to have him visit us from the West Coast. He will also bring a number of his recently published Civil War titles which will be

available for purchase by RT members.

Our first meeting of the New Year will be held in Cameron Hall on UNC-W campus, Room 132, 7:30 pm, on Thursday, January 9. (Cameron Hall is located 200-300 yards east (or behind) King Hall, where our meetings were held last year. Parking Lot R is just in front of Cameron Hall, while Parking Lot S is the next closest to our new location).

SPRING BUS TOUR: RICHMOND AND THE SEVEN DAYS CAMPAIGN ! Time to Sign Up!

The Seven Days Campaign marked the debut of Robert E. Lee as the field commander of the legendary Army of Northern Virginia. In a series of aggressive initiatives, Lee attacked McClellan's huge Army of the Potomac at Beaver Dam Creek, Gaines' Mill, Savage Station, Frayser's Farm, and Malvern Hill. On our Saturday tour with Robert E. Lee Krick we'll visit each of these sites.

Our tour will also cover Confederate Richmond; on Friday afternoon and Sunday morning, we'll see numerous sites in the old Capitol of the Confederacy associated with the war.

We leave Wilmington at 8:00 am Friday, March 21 and return about 4:30 Sunday afternoon, March 23. We've reserved rooms at the very comfortable Sheraton Inn where we'll enjoy Friday dinner with Mr. Krick who will provide an overview of the Seven Days Campaign.

The cost is \$185 per person double occupancy and \$235 single occupancy. This total includes two nights at the Sheraton, dinner Friday night, Saturday box lunch, dinner Saturday night, and guide service fees. Sign-up deadline is Monday, March 3. CONFEDERATES AT OAKDALE CEMETERY

On Sunday afternoon, November 24, at 3:00 pm, local members of the McRae family, as well as Dan Geddie, Harry Daniel, John D. Taylor, Wayne Carver, Chris Fonvielle, and George Slaton of the Round Table gathered at Oakdale for a rededication of the gravemarker for CSA Brigadier General William McRae. General McRae, a Wilmington native, was a hard-fighting brigade commander in Lee's army. This ceremony resulted from the efforts of Chris Fonvielle and Hugh McRae of Wilmington and Scott Mauger of Richmond to secure an attractive marble tombstone for the general. Hugh McRae, a descendent, gave a summary of General McRae's life and military service. A CSA reenactment color guard was on hand and fired volleys from their period muskets. It was an impressive ceremony.

Afterwards, several of us gathered with Scott Mauger to look for other Confederate soldier tombstones in the cemetery. Scott is a well-known necrolithologist, a Civil War enthusiast who searches out the burial places of Union and Confederate soldiers, especially generals and other officers. He has personally visited the gravesites of every CSA general, about 425 in number! As our group walked through the cemetery, encountering a number of officers' gravesites, our enthusiasm grew. We talked about the possibility of researching and recording all the CW soldiers' burial at

Oakdale.

The next day, Wayne Carver was out at Oakdale bright and early! Armed with a very brief list of Confederates compiled by the Oakdale staff, Wayne began systematically walking through the cemetery, looking for the small CSA marble markers placed by the United Daughters of the Confederacy at the foot of soldiers' graves. Wayne then moved back and forth from the graves to the cemetery office, gathering information and plotting locations. Soon, he was using James Sprunt's 1914 Chronicles of the Lower Cape Fear to determine the names and service of Wilmington area CSA officers who were likely buried at Oakdale. Day after day, Wayne visited Oakdale, finding more and more CSA officer burials. To this date, Wayne has located the burials of 160 Confederates, mostly officers, in Oakdale Cemetery! These include at least 3 generals, 17 colonels, 7 lieutenant colonels, 14 majors, 46 captains, 38 lieutenants, 8 surgeons, 2 chaplains, 4 sergeant majors, 1 spy, and 1 attorney general! Recently, Dan Geddie and I spent four hours following Wayne through Oakdale as he pointed out the gravesites of many of these veterans. Dan is now compiling a list of CSA enlisted men buried at Oakdale.

Our idea eventually is to make a complete list of these CSA burials and then add a brief biographical sketch of each soldier found. Wayne has already done considerable research in the

North Carolina Room at the public libary with the help of Beverly Tetterton.

And Wayne's enthusiasm is already taking him beyond Oakdale! Several days ago, Wayne tracked down the grave of CSA Captain Edward C. Armstrong, a well-known local officer who was killed at Spotsylvania Courthouse in May, 1864. He found Armstrong's grave in a small and obscure family cemetery in Pender County, probably on the site of the former Armstrong plantation.

We hope to plan a spring tour of Confederate Oakdale for RT members. In the meantime, if you're interested in joining Wayne Carver in his searching and researching, he would be happy for you to contact him at 791-0105 (home). This is a big project which has room for several volunteers.

And one thing leads to another. The morning that Wayne. Dan and I were at Oakdale, an elderly lady stopped her car to ask directions to the grave of General WHC Whiting. Turns out she was a Whiting family descendent visiting from Pennsylvania. After a long discussion about Whiting, we led her to his grave and helped her do a rubbing of the inscription. She confessed that, though she herself is proud of her connection to the general, the published history of the Whiting family, which has strong roots in the North, left out any mention of General Whiting who was seen by other family members as 'that Rebel general!"

And speaking of Oakdale Cemetery....you may be interested in visiting the cemetery on Friday, January 10, at 10:00 am. You'll witness the dedication of 'Little Billy,' a reproduction Model 1857 light twelve-pounder Napoleon bronze cannon which will become a permanent display at Fort Fisher Historic Site. The cannon, of course, is named for General Whiting! The cannon will likely be fired at Oakdale during the dedication, a sight and sound to behold.

That Saturday, January 11, 3:30 pm, there will be a reenactment at Fort Fisher of the Union infantry charge of the fort. Both Union and Confederate reenactors will take part. A Civil War encampment will be held Saturday and Sunday for the public. It's free and sounds like fun.
