# BLOCKADE RUNNING DURING THE CIVIL WAR September 5 Meeting

The first program of the 1996-1997 year of the Cape Fear Civil War Round Table will feature blockade running, a topic of great interest to many of our members. And we are fortunate to have as our guest speaker, Stephen R. Wise, Ph.D., the leading authority on the Confederacy's use of blockade runners.

Throughout the Civil War, the Confederacy was forced to sustain its armies through the use of innovative steam-propelled blockade runners. Dr. Wise will provide an overview of the extensive supply system that allowed the Confederacy to wage a successful war effort. Not only was blockade running vital to the South's war effort, but it also provided the nation with a folklore that centered around daredevil captains, brave women and fearless crews. The talk will cover the individuals involved in blockade running, the specialized vessels, how the system was financed and what it did to support the South. Special emphasis will be placed on Wilmington and its position as the Confederacy's primary blockade running port.

Dr. Stephen R. Wise, an historian who lives in Beaufort, SC, is the director of the museum at Parris Island SC, and the Cultural Resource Manager for the Marine Corps Recruit Depot located a Parris Island. A native of Toledo, Ohio, Dr. Wise received his bachelor degree from Wittenberg University and a masters degree from Bowling Green State University. Drawn to the University of South Carolina to study under the direction of the late Thomas L. Connelly, a noted author and CW

historian, Wise earned his doctoral degree in 1983.

Dr. Wise's first book, Lifeline of the Confederacy: Blockade Running During the Civil War, was highly acclaimed as a comprehensive account of the Confederate effort to deliver supplies through the northern blockade. A second book entitled Gate of Hell: The Campaign for Charleston Harbor 1863, which covers the 1863 campaign that found northern troops battling on Morris Island for the control of Charleston harbor, was published by the University of South Carolina Press in June, 1994. Gate of Hell was given an award by the South Carolina Historical Society as the best book written in 1994 on South Carolina history. A future work will feature photographs of Beaufort, SC during the Civil War.

A well-known lecturer, Dr. Wise has been the featured speaker on Cunard passenger liners and Windspirit cruises. He has appeared on the Arts and Entertainment Channel as a featured speaker for the television show Civil War Journal and in various South Carolina Education Television productions. In 1996, he received the Daughters of the American Revolution History Medal for his service in promoting the history of the United States. Dr. Wise also teaches history as an adjunct professor at the Beaufort campus of the University of South Carolina and serves on the board of the Historic Beaufort Foundation and the South Carolina Battlefield Preservation Trust. He is also active in Civil War Round Tables and local historical societies.

Don't miss this first program of the year! It will be a super one, the first in a great lineup of Civil War programs for the RT in 1996-1997. We urge you to bring a friend or two along.
