THE 425+ GENERALS OF THE CONFEDERACY Described, Categorized, and Analyzed

September 18 Meeting St. John's Episcopal Church

Who were these men, some of whom were immortalized and lionized in the mystigue of the Lost Cause and some of whom faded forgotten into the past? Fame and notoriety, skill and incompetence, courage and cowardice, youth and old age, aristocrat and commoner, Southerner and Yankee, American and foreign, well-educated and poorly-educated, they are all represented in this group of 425 men. It is a group marked by contrast and diversity.

Harry Daniel, a member of the CFCWRT, has for many years researched the fascinating lives and fortunes of these Confederate commanders. He has traveled to their hometowns, visited their gravesites, and tracked their family connections, educational backgrounds, their pre and postwar careers. Harry's research has gleaned a wealth of knowledge and understanding, and his program will provide us with new perspectives about this group of men.

Harry, an ordained minister, is known throughout the Presbyterian Church in the southeastern states as a consummate teacher and Biblical scholar. He received his M.A. and Ph.D. from Vanderbilt University following his undergraduate work at Davidson College, his seminary training at Columbia Theological Seminary, and graduate work at the University of Chicago. He has won numerous academic awards and honors and published a number of articles in scholarly journals. Harry has taught at three seminaries and served churches in Louisville and Paducah, KY, Decatur, GA, Auburn, AL, and is currently serving as Interim Minister at St. Andrews-Covenant Presbyterian Church in Wilmington.

St. John's Episcopal Church, Elebush Hall, is the location for our first meeting of the new RT year. Refreshments will be served at 7:00 pm, and the program will begin at 7:30 pm. CUSHING FOR SALE!

The Cape Fear Civil War Round Table will sell at the September meeting copies of the summer '97 issue of *Blue & Gray Magazine* featuring historian Chris E. Fonvielle, Jr.'s article "William B. Cushing: Commando at the Cape Fear." Although best known for sabotaging the Confederate ironclad *Albemarle* at Plymouth NC in 1864, Cushing spent most of his wartime service with the U.S. Navy's Wilmington blockading squadron. The audacious commando made several daring raids behind enemy lines at the Cape Fear and later played a key role in the Wilmington Campaign. Dubbed the "darling of the American Navy," Cushing emerged from the Civil War better known and more popular than most admirals. Copies of the magazine are \$5, with all proceeds donated to the RT.

BOOK REVIEW

THE WILMINGTON CAMPAIGN: LAST RAYS OF DEPARTING HOPE Chris E. Fonvielle, Jr. Savas Publishing Company, 1997

There it was. It was as if I'd always known it would be there for me. Why had it taken so long?

I rounded one of the countless corners on the Appalachian Trail as it coursed through western North Carolina. What I saw was not a soul-stirring vista, although there are plenty to enthrall the eye. I didn't even come across a black bear, although I'm still anticipating my first ursine encounter.

And there it was. Almost hidden amongst the lush springtime foliage was a pink Lady's Slipper, a lone mauve sentinel in a sea of green.

As a boy growing up in woodsy northern Minnesota, I had memorized that the Lady's Slipper was the state flower. And in years of rounding countless woodsy corners, there and elsewhere, I had never seen one and had never really given it much thought. So here I was, face to face with a reality, which heretofore had been just a vague neural connection, stored away years before for perhaps some future resurrection. Should I takes its picture? No, better to savor the moment. Better to, in the words of inveterate hiker Colin Fletcher, (*The Man Who Walked Through Time*), put it on the "emulsion of my mind."

The Appalachian Trail is only one of my current journeys. Equally enjoyable is my journey through Civil War literature. As on the trail, there are lots of literary flowers, most of them rather generic reds and yellows, each important but few spectacular. But then, I rounded the corner and there stands another of those mauve sentinels, surpassing in scholarship or in storytelling or in just the fine tuning of the English language, the more generic of the latest "definitive work." Civil War scholar, Wilmington native and fellow Cape Fear Civil War Round Table member Chris Fonvielle has added another Lady's Slipper to the bookshelf.

Cover up the author's name and open the book to any page. What you will find is "comprehensive but succinct, scholarly without being pedantic...compellingly readable." These are the very words from the New York Times Book Review of James M. McPherson's Battle Cry of Freedom. They also apply to Fonvielle's new book. Read on. You'll soon discover that this work is "a model of historical presentation of the American Civil War, worthy to stand alongside the great works of narrative history." These words come from the dust jacket of Shelby Foote's Stars in Their Courses: The Gettysburg Campaign. They also apply.

So what has author Fonvielle done to be placed with such lofty company? Simply stated, he has woven in a most compelling fashion the elusive mixture of primary source material, photographs (many previously unpublished), maps and diagrams into a narrative tapestry that holds the reader captive from the opening chase of the blockade runner *Advance* to gain the protective umbrella of Fort Fisher's batteries to the Stars and Stripes hanging in Thalian Hall. In places, the language is almost poetic, reminiscent of Boris Pasternak as Zhivago struggles in revolution-torn Russia. The narrative, a surely difficult undertaking when faced with stacks of notecards, flows smoothly and with sufficient intrigue and expectation to hold the reader it its grasp. In his Foreward, North Carolina author Mark Bradley sensed this too, when he wrote that "Chris' narrative pulls readers into his drama and transports them..." Not since *Killer Angels* have I sat at the feet of such a masterful storyteller.

Like most of you, I'm usually plowing through two or three Civil War books at any time. And usually, given my ploddingly slow reading speed, I calculate how many weeks it's going to take me to "get through this one." flogging myself through another "classic" that everyone else seems to have read. And then came *Last Rays of Departing Hope* and I found myself wanting to stretch it out, make it last longer, savor the moment and imprint it on the "emulsion of my mind." It's that kind of flower. You've seen all the others. Turn the next corner. It's waiting for you there.

The third annual Civil War Conference hosted by the NCCWTC will be held in Wilmington during the last weekend of September. This year's conference will feature the war in eastern North Carolina, the Wilmington campaign, and life in wartime Wilmington. Speakers include Rod Gragg (Fort Fisher) and Chris Fonvielle (Wilmington Campaign), David Long (Burnside Campaign), Robert Browning (North Atlantic Blockading Squadron), Steve Wise (Blockade Running into Wilmington), Beverly Tetterton (Social History of Wilmington and Women During the War), and John Haley (African-Americans in the Lower Cape Fear, 1861-1865).

The keynote speaker will be William C. Davis, who is one of the four or five leading CW historians in America. He has written numerous important books on the Civil War and is a speaker in great demand.
