With his discoveries in Civil War photography, his work as a motorsports writer and his award-winning investigative newspaper reporting, writer and journalist Bob Zeller finds hidden stories and brings them to light. Zeller's highly acclaimed The Civil War In Depth, Vol I, was the first 3-D photographic history of the war ever published. It has captivated thousands of Civil War buffs who were unaware that the greatest wartime photographs were created in 3-D. The Civil War In Depth, Vol II, complete with a 3-D viewer, was recently published by Chronicle Books. This new volume features more photographic discoveries, as well as a chapter of wartime views in color.

Bob Zeller, a native of Washington DC, is a graduate of the University of Missouri School of Journalism. He was an investigative reporter (1976-1990) at *The Clarion-Ledger* in Jackson, Mississippi and *The Press-Telegram* in Long Beach, California. As a motorsports writer (1991-1998) for Landmark Newspapers, he covered the NASCAR Winston Cup series. In late 1998, Bob left his newspaper career to become a freelance writer. Bob resides in Pleasant Garden NC.
