Figuring prominently in the annals of Lee's Army of Northern Virginia, the 26th North Carolina Regiment was a superb fighting unit. Especially noteworthy was this regiment's participation in the Battle of Gettysburg where, engaged with the Iron Brigade on the first day and making a valiant assault in the Pickett-Pettigrew Charge on the third day, it sustained unusually high casualties.

Rod Gragg's recent Covered With Glory: The 26th North Carolina Infantry at the Battle of Gettysburg (Harper/Collins) has won a wide audience of readers. Rod will bring copies of his book for sale and signing.

Rod lives with his family in Conway SC. He holds an M.A. in American History from the University of South Carolina. Rod's Confederate Goliath: The Battle of Fort Fisher was published in 1991. This dramatic narrative won the New York City Civil War Round Table's coveted Fletcher Pratt Award. His The Confederate Illustrated Reader won the Douglas Southall Freeman Award for History.

IN MEMORIAM James Campbell Steadman

The Cape Fear Civil War Round Table extends its deepest condolences to Linda Earle Steadman following the death of her husband, Jim. Both Jim and Linda Earle have been active members in the Round Table, attending regular meetings as frequently as Jim's medical condition would allow.

Jim was deservedly proud of his ancestor, Colonel Reuben P. Campbell, the commander of the 7th North Carolina Regiment. Colonel Campbell, a native of Iredell County NC and a graduate of West Point (Class of 1840) was engaged at the Battle of Gaines Mill in June, 1862 when, "picking up the fallen colors and advancing in front of his men," he was mortally wounded.

Jim researched his ancestor's history and visited the battlefields where he exercised command. On June 12, 1999, he convened a rededication of Colonel Campbell's monument in the cemetery of Snow Creek Methodist Church near Statesville.

In the spirit of his Confederate forebear, Jim Steadman struggled courageously against cancer and maintained an active life in his church and community during his long illness. We will miss his warm presence and his enthusiasm for the Civil War.

The well²known Central Virginia Battlefields Trust is celebrating its purchase of a significant parcel of property on the Talley Farm at Chancellorsville. The site was the scene of intense action when Stonewall Jackson's troops stormed into the Federal position on May 2, 1863. CVBT is also supporting the National Park Service's recommended restoration of the famous Sunken Road in Fredericksburg. The City of Fredericksburg is being asked to close this short section of the roadway. You may want to contact Mayor William Beck, Box 7447, Fredericksburg VA 22404 to support the NPS request to close the road.

A great travel destination for the summer is the brand new National Civil War Museum in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. This \$36 million facility has 11,000 artifacts including Pickett's kepi, Lee's Bible, Stuart's sword, Grant's sword belt and more. The Civil War Preservation Trust accomplished much in battlefield preservation during the year 2000. One significant purchase was an additional 245 acre tract at Malvern Hill in the area where Jackson's infantry attacked the Union right flank. The property is partly wooded and mostly open farmland.
