THE LAST GENERATION: LEE'S YOUNG OFFICERS CORPS

An Evening With Peter S. Carmichael Thursday, October 12

Peter S. Carmichael is one of the rising stars among Civil War historians. Awarded his Ph.D. from Pennsylvania State University where he studied with Gary Gallagher, Peter is an acknowledged expert on the Army of Northern Virginia. We're fortunate to have him as the

speaker for our annual Fall dinner meeting at the Cape Fear Club.

Currently, Peter is an assistant professor of history at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. He is the author of Lee's Young Artillerist: William R. J. Pegram (University of Virginia Press, 1995) and has contributed numerous articles to Civil War Times Illustrated, North and South Magazine, and the University of North Carolina's Military Campaigns of the Civil War Series. He is currently finishing a group biography of young Virginians during the 1850's and the Civil War. Copies of Lee's Young Artillerist: William R. J. Pegram will be available (\$25.00) for

Peter's presentation will focus primarily on Virginia men who came of age during the 1850's, the contentious political decade before the Civil War. They were the last white generation to grow up with the institution of slavery. By Fort Sumter, they had a strong sense of being Southern and they consequently wanted their state to leave the Union when others preferred a moderate course. During the war, they became the zealots of the Confederacy, the Young Lions who recklessly fought on the battlefields while never losing faith in the South, even when the cause appeared hopeless. Why these young men saw themselves as crusaders for the Confederacy, the defenders of a Southern nation that they believed was the last bastion of Christendom will be the subject of Peter's talk. Their experience parallels that of many other young men who fought in the Southern ranks. And when appropriate, Peter will make comparisions to North Carolina officers who served in Lee's army.

This dinner meeting will be one of the highlights of the Round Table year. As usual for these

events, we're expecting a large crowd. Bring your friends!
